We are organising an exciting series of three arts workshops at which you can tell your story in the form of quilting and poetry.

Together with experienced, talented artists Lois Blackburn and Phil Davenport (arthur+martha), you will have the opportunity to contribute to the creation of a beautiful, exhibition-standard war widows' quilt and to write your very own poetry. Art can tell stories that interviews and written accounts cannot, and they also allow the public to understand war widows' lives in a different way.

We warmly invite you to this first of our three workshops amidst the beautiful interiors of The Queen's House in Greenwich during Remembrance Week 2018. The workshop will last two hours, and you may take part for as little or as much of this time as you wish. Refreshments will be provided, and participants are invited to join us for a drinks reception in the same venue later in the early evening, after the workshop, to celebrate the War Widows' Stories project.
